Introduction

Welcome to the Radical Routes Social Audit Members' Questionnaire and Thank-you for sparing the time to take part.

What's it all about?

The purpose of this questionnaire is to get a better understanding of people's experience of Radical Routes and its member co-operatives. In particular we're interested in how living or working in a Radical Routes co-op improves people's lives and supports people acting for political, social & environmental change.

What can I expect?

The questionnaire should take around 15 minutes to complete. It will mainly ask you how much you agree or disagree with various statements or to choose options from a list; it will also ask for a few facts about your time in co-ops. There is some opportunity to give longer answers, but only if you want to.

We would like you to confine your answers to the co-op you are currently a member of.

If you are currently a member of more than one Radical Route co-op (for example a housing co-op and a workers' co-op) you will be able to answer questions about both, but only if these are different types of co-op (workers', housing or social centre). The survey will take longer for multiple co-ops.

There is no 'correct' answer to any of the questions; we just ask that you select the answer which you feel best reflects your views at the present time – quick spontaneous answers are ideal.

The questionnaire is completely anonymous and will not ask for anything that would identify you personally. It will however ask a few possibly sensitive questions about, for example, race and gender identity. There is no obligation to answer any of these questions; however understanding the specific experiences of groups within the Radical Routes community is helpful. Radical Routes as an organisation aspires to challenge the privileges and oppressions that permeate mainstream society: which undoubtedly also enter our more radical spaces unless we take active steps to understand & counter them. So if you feel able to answer these questions we will use that information wisely.

How will the information be used?

The information gathered will be used as part of a Social Audit of the Radical Routes network, the results of which will be made available to our members and investors and published on our website http://www.radicalroutes.org.uk. The Social Audit is a piece of research work, being carried out by Catalyst Collective Ltd on behalf of Radical Routes. The purpose of the research is to ask whether Radical Routes is being effective in meeting its stated Social and Environmental aims. 
