
Radical Routes is a mutual aid network of housing co-operatives, worker co-operatives and social centres. Members of the co-operatives are working towards the shared social and political vision of Radical Routes – this vision is not dogmatically defined, but is centred around taking power and responsibility back to grassroots level, participatory democracy, egalitarianism and ethical and environmentally sustainable societies. Member groups have a positive ecological outlook, support grassroots resistance to injustice and oppose capitalist systems of money as power, exploitation and hierarchy.


Co-operatives enable people who are in low paid work or unemployed to collectively take out mortgages and other loans beyond their individual reach. Members of housing co-ops are together, the landlord that own and manages their homes. Without either a private or public landlord dependent on our support our rents don't rise and with the mortgage repaid may fall to cover only management and maintenance costs, or be kept at a level that allows the funding of other projects. Similarly, workers co-operatives control work without the results of their labour being diverted to share holders, directors and managers.

Radical Routes helps to register co-ops, offers training, provides mediators and facilitators in the event of conflict and acts as a forum for exchange of information about and between co-ops. We also raise finance to help members buy housing, land and equipment. Through taking control over such resources we aim to reduce reliance on dominant economic, social and political structures. We are building bases from which these may be challenged and where we can develop practical alternatives – not just in housing and work but also in education, leisure and wider social relations.

We are not restricted by state funding or charitable status, we operate without a controlling bureaucracy of paid administrators, and we do not provide and control what people need but help provide the means by which they can act for themselves.

THE SEVEN CO-OPERATIVE PRINCIPLES

1. Voluntary & Open Membership

Co-operatives are voluntary organisations, open to all persons able to use their services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.

2. Democratic Member Control

Co-operatives are democratic organisations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting their policies and making decisions. Men and women serving as elected representatives are accountable to the membership. In primary co-operatives members have equal voting rights [one member one vote] and co-operatives at other levels are also organised in a Democratic manner.

3. Member Economic Participation

Members contribute equitably to, and democratically control, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital is usually the common property of the cooperative. Members usually receive limited compensation, if any, on capital subscribed as a condition of membership. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing their co-operative, possibly by setting up reserves, part of which would be indivisible; benefiting members in proportion to their transactions with the co-operative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership.

4. Autonomy & Independence

Co-operatives are autonomous, self-help organisations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organisations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control by their members and maintain their co-operative autonomy.

5. Education, Training & Information

Co-operatives provide education and training for their members, elected representatives, managers and employees so they can contribute effectively to the development of the co-operatives. They inform the general public, particularly young people and opinion leaders, about the nature and benefits of co-operation.

6. Co-operation among Co-operatives

Co-operatives serve their members most effectively and strengthen the co-operative movement by working together through local, national regional and international structures.

7. Concern for Community

Co-operatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies approved by their members.

THE AIMS & PRINCIPLES OF RADICAL ROUTES

Here we are in 21st century Britain, a world not of our making but one that has been moulded over thousands of years of exploitation and injustice. A world shaped by the forces of greed, capitalism and materialism; where maximum production and optimum profits are vigorously pursued, making life a misery for many and putting us and the environment at risk. The rich and powerful, the capitalists and bureaucrats ultimately control the system, through mechanisms including ownership of the economy [making people slaves to a job] and control of the media [creating a passive culture].

Radical Routes is a network of co-ops and individuals seeking to change this. We want a world based on equality and co-operation, where people give according to their ability and receive according to their needs, where work is fulfilling and useful, creativity is encouraged, decision-making is open to everyone with no hierarchies and where the environment is respected in its own right rather than exploited.

We want to take control over all aspects of our lives. However, as we are not all in a position of control we are forced to compromise in order to exist. We are working towards control over our housing, education and work, through setting up housing and worker co-ops, and co-operating as a network. Through gaining collective control over these areas we aim to reduce reliance on exploitative structures and build secure bases from which to challenge the system and encourage others to do so.

Radical Routes has developed from an idea in the mid 80's to a secondary coop registered in April 1992. In 1986 New Education Housing Cooperative was loaned £7,000 by supporters to put down a deposit on a house in Birmingham. From this Radical Routes has grown via staging educational events, spreading information, a will to seek like-minded people and investment from supporters into an expanding network of like-minded co-ops and individuals. The formation of the secondary co-op has provided a structure to pursue our collective aims in a more efficient way, by promoting and raising funds for its member co-ops.

Radical Routes has limited resources and recognises that its particular work towards the above aims are only some of many valid activities. The specific means it is pursuing are:

- The setting up of housing co-ops to house people and projects with the above aims.
- The setting up of workers co-ops that operate with the above aims.
- · The setting up of social centres with the above aims.
- The promotion and organisation of participatory education through skills and knowledge sharing events, Taking Control events, informative material and work shops.
- The raising of finance to take control over resources [property, technology, land...] through co-operation and economic interlocking of the co-ops.
- · The support of like-minded projects.

The **Radical Routes** network is run through quarterly gatherings of the membership. Before each gathering an agenda is sent out to all member cooperatives, the agenda includes proposals on which decisions must be reached. The issues are discussed at each co-operative and a delegate takes the groups decision to the gathering. All co-operatives can put forward proposals for discussion, as can the internal working groups responsible for the day to day running of **Radical Routes**.

Gatherings are weekend events based around the main business meeting, this meeting is the focus of decision making within the network. Consensus decisions are always sought and almost always reached, though it may take more than one gathering to finalise some decisions. In this way gatherings guide **Radical Routes**, making and amending policies, deciding on the admission of new members and making loans to the existing membership. The booklet *An Introduction to Radical Routes* gives a more detailed account of this decision making process.

Each gathering includes an introduction to Radical Routes session for

share meals, childcare, parties etc. when we feel like it. We are a mix of workers, unemployed and students, but share interests in community activism, sustainability & recycling, arts, gardening, eating and drinking.

At the moment we have 7 adults and 4 children living here.


FIRESIDE HOUSING CO-OPERATIVE

Household decisions are made by consensus through regular meetings and on a day to day basis. We try to minimise our use of products which involve animal, human and environmental exploitation and as much waste as possible is recycled, we use composting toilets and in future we intend to use appropriate technology and alternative energy sources. We welcome children and support home education.

A large field and campers kitchen are available at cheap rates for camps, courses, workshops and small gatherings. We regularly host and organise events such as permaculture courses and green gatherings. If you would like to use the facilities or want a programme of events please contact us.

Earthworm promotes and liases with Radical Routes. We run our own loan stock scheme and welcome enquiries from potential investors. Earthworm Housing Co-operative have lived and worked at Wheatstone since late 1989. We bought the property, a large old house and outbuildings with 7 acres of land, in 1995. Before we arrived Wheatstone had been a community with a turbulent history. The buildings were neglected and vandalised so we have had to do a lot of repair work and restoration. Accommodation is still very basic, the house is quite scruffy and conditions are harsh in winter. We want to make a more comfortable and energy efficient home and work on the buildings is undertaken whenever finances allow.

Our primary focus is on Wheatstone as an environmental project. We are exploring and promoting an ecologically sustainable lifestyle. The land is farmed using permaculture and forest garden methods, and veganically - without the use of animal products, animal labour or singles. We have permaculture people, a geodesic dome designer, a county parks and woodlands officer, a web-site designer, an chemicals. There is a large vegetable garden with herbs and soft fruit, an orchard, a green house, two poly-tunnels, ponds, a 'wet system' and

CALON YN TYFU CYF [GROWING HEART]

wales RW

Calon yn Tyfu Cyf [Growing Heart Workers' Co-operative] is involved in Earth restoration. We are closely connected with Pangaia [see the entry in Part One] and Henparcau Farm where we rent the land.

So far we have planted a half acre orchard, established a fruit tree nursery producing 1500 fruit trees each year and 3000 nut trees as well as at least 10,000 local provenance broadleaf trees.

We are also market gardening about 7 acres of vegetables as well as having established a couple of acres of nut trees and willow beds for basketry and craft and for firewood. We make cider traditionally, using equipment from the 1850's and have been producing 6000 bottles a year. From this summer [2001] we hope to increase this to 10,000 bottles.

Outside Henparcau we manage 164 acres of woodland and have planted 750,000 broadleaf trees in West Wales. Each autumn we collect tonnes of tree seeds. We normally have work available and arecurrently looking for new members as well as casual workers.

closes offering welfare rights advice and help with problems at work. A Womens Health Open Group also uses the premises one Saturday each month. Fund raising jumble sales are also becoming regular events.

We have an additional building in need of renovation or replacement which, when ready, will house a children's space o the ground floor which will be used as a creche and by an after school club and home educators groups. The upstairs will be divided into an office and a library and all rooms will double as function rooms where local groups can meet.

Members of the club live in the flat above the club as Elm Tree Housing Co-operative.

To join the Cowley Club you must have been involved in the running of the social centre for three months. Members of political partys are not invited to join because the values of the co-operative are based (in the spirit of local activist Harry Cowley) on self-responsibility, self-help, equity, solidarity and grass-roots control outside the influence of political partys and similar coercive hierarchical groupings. This restriction does not apply to members of trade unions.

A separate organisation, the 12 London Road Social Club, runs a bar inside the Cowley Club premises in the evenings. It too is a co-operative owned and controlled by its members and it depends upon volunteers from the membership to run its bar and organise entertainments. There is live music - including open mike nights, videos, talks, dj's, and the occasional pub quiz. If we think there is enough interest the bar is opened on Sunday afternoons and sometimes members cook fund-raising Sunday dinners for causes in which they are involved.

Equinox Housing Cooperative was born in 1994 from a small group of people involved in campaigning on the environment and young people's rights. We were putting a lot of energy and time into trying to stop various abuses of people and planet and felt we were having a real effect. It's not enough to simply say 'stop'! We need to build positive visions and structures as the forces of capitalism will always portray us as mad, impossible dreamers. Dreamers we are, mad we are not. Creating a different society based on cooperation not competition, support not exploitation is not impossible, it's the only answer for a future worth living in and we have to start creating it now.

So in June 1995, to provide a stable home for campaigners, workshops and a resource centre for like minded people; to try out 'green' building practices and living co-operatively, we bought a house. We are 7 members and a dog, who when not fixing the roof (still) or building (still), are involved in environmental, genetic engineering and food issues campaigning, local community issues, gardening and sustainable woodland projects.

Four years on.... we have turned the tarmac yards in the front and back into thriving and diverse gardens complete with pond, have two woodsheds and a wood workshop for the carpentry minded folk, a bike/chainsaw maintenance, welding and power tools workshop, an office and soon a climbing training wall.

What we do is made possible by co-operation and through using the existing financial system to our collective advantage. The latter is not something we are happy with but we do what is currently possible, or we do nothing.

The **Radical Routes** worker co-operatives finance themselves in the same way as conventional businesses and with loans from **Radical Routes** but housing co-operatives in the network usually finance their projects in one or more of the following ways:

 A Mortgage. Mortgages are generally from lenders with some form of ethical policy, either Triodos Bank or the Ecology Building Society. Lenders usually provide 70% - 80% mortgages leaving co-operatives to raise the rest from other sources.

The remaining 20% - 30% of the cost of the house can be a lot of money. This amount is raised through loan stock and/or a loan from **Radical Routes**.

- 2. <u>Loan Stock</u>. Housing co-operatives are able to advertise and issue loan stock to the public (see the **Radical Routes** publication *How to Set Up a Housing Co-operative* for details) and many raise significant amounts from members, family, friends and other supporters in this way.
- 3. A Radical Routes Loan. Radical Routes lends money to member housing and worker co-operatives at rates of interest significantly below that charged by conventional lenders. Loans of up to around £40,000 have been made to individual co-operatives, such loans are made possible by Rootstock Limited, the financial arm of Radical Routes. Supporters buy shares in Rootstock, on which they can choose their rate of interest. Loans can then be made to Radical Routes co-ops at low rates of interest because many investors choose low rates of interest for themselves, or do not ask for any at all.

People invest in **Rootstock** because they share a similar outlook to **Radical Routes**. They do not wish the blind pursuit of maximum, short-term monetary gain, which underpins poverty, oppression and environmental destruction around the globe. Of course money invested in **Rootstock** and **Radical Routes** is only temporarily diverted from such uses but while money is in our

work very cost effective.



Most of our customers are environmental and social activist organisations and individuals but we also print for a number of small businesses in and around Leeds. For more information regarding our set up and our environmental and social policy take a look at the website.

We live on a 70 acre former dairy farm in Carmarthenshire called Werndolau and its home to 9 adults and 5 children as well as a flow of Wwoofers in our two farmhouses, 3 mobile homes, 3 tourer caravans and yurt.

Members run **Organics to Go** from the farm. This is Wales' largest organic box scheme, providing over 800 deliveries every week as well as providing outlets for 9 other farm producers in West Wales. It was set up to offer a alternative to supermarkets and people working for it are on the same small but ample wage so that profits can be put back into developing the project (and also ensures that we can't consume too much!)

We've got a lot to do; a lot to learn and we're going to make mistakes. We wish to provide space for members to follow their vocations whilst sharing the opportunity to learn hands-on organic farming and gain community experience with as many people as possible. We sometimes have space for short-term volunteers to live and work with us.

Good design and clear structure is how we manage to do all the things that we do – there's an all organic, vegan communal meal cooked every day and we bake our own bread; we use rotas to share out domestic jobs fairly; we have regular emotions meetings to keep things sane and vibes friendly as well as

community weekends where we hang out together.

As a community we live healthily and support freedom from addiction so this is not a drinky/druggy/smoky place. For the same reasons we don't have TVs or computer games as well as processed sugar and caffeine.

As a green community we encourage alternatives to car use and also we use ethical and ecological products in maintaining and developing the farm. Whilst not having any specific spiritual focus we all know that our organic growing is part of some "bigger picture" and we share our skills in reiki, massage, astrology, yoga and tai chi.

Most importantly we naturally nurture, respect and home-educate our children - this is a good place to come for support as a parent and a bad place if you don't like being around kids!

These include: a reasonable bit of DIY repair and renewal, the most exciting moments occurring in the upper echelons of the building, nothing to do with the view of the Valley Parade corner flag; the development of a nice wee garden cum scrapyard; the establishment of a street association and community garden; playing an active role in Radical Routes, most noticeably as the editorial collective for the newsletter Radical Rumours; and a bicycle breeding programme that's seen us chasing off Raleigh corporate spies.
